The instrument which they framed was a compact between sovereign States, who, parting with many of the attributes of sovereignty, bestowed these upon the government then established. Necessarily, in the course of time, questions would arise between these States and the general government, questions between the departments of the general government, questions also between the States themselves, which could not be submitted for solution to the judicial department of any one State. These questions could only be solved in tribunals created by the general government, whose decisions could bind all the States. To the government created by the Constitution was entrusted the control and management of all relations with foreign governments. It had the sole power of making treaties, of declaring war, of concluding peace. These treaties binding...
